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Welcome to the Network

Welcome to the Advancing Conservation through Empathy for Wildlife (ACE for Wildlife®) Network! This welcome guide, created by the Communications Committee, is intended to help you orient yourself to the Network, the platforms we use to connect, and provide some guidance for exploring what the Network has to offer.

Created in 2019, the ACE for Wildlife Network facilitates the sharing of knowledge, experiences, and data to drive conservation change through fostering empathy for animals and the environment that sustains them. In the beginning, the ACE for Wildlife Network consisted of 20 zoos and aquariums throughout Alaska, Washington, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, Minnesota, and Wisconsin, with Woodland Park Zoo serving as the Network's home-base. Since then, we have become a recognized conservation leader in the zoo and aquarium field. Today, we have over 30 Partner Organizations across the United States and over 1,000 people engaged in this work worldwide. The Network is made up of Members (staff and volunteers at any of our Partner Organizations) and Affiliates (staff and volunteers not at Partner Organizations). As a part of this community, you are now part of a global movement to reconnect people with the natural world.

The Network is staffed by the Advancing Empathy team at Woodland Park Zoo. They oversee the overall direction and everyday facilitation of the Network. The activities and priorities of the Network are sculpted by the Network's various committees. These committees are made up of both Network Members and Affiliates who provide a diverse range of perspectives. As part of Woodland Park Zoo's Advancing Empathy Initiatives, the Advancing Empathy Grant Program operates alongside the ACE for Wildlife Network. Getting Started: Navigating the Website

If you work at a Partner Organization, you will become a Member upon the creation of an account. When creating an account, please use the email domain associated with your organization (e.g., yourname@zoo.org). These email domains are automatically preapproved and your access to the website and discussion board will be immediate.

If you do not work at a Partner Organization, sign up to become an Affiliate by clicking “Sign Up” in the top right-hand corner of our website and enter the requested information. Please use your work email associated with your current employer when creating your account. Individuals who work at a facility accredited by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) should receive access to the website within 7 days of account creation. Individuals who sign up to join the Network as an Affiliate that do not work at an AZA-accredited facility will be reviewed by the Network’s Membership Committee before their account is activated. As a result, access to the Network’s website and resources may be delayed by an additional 1–2 weeks.

Our website is the primary way that you’ll engage with the ACE for Wildlife Network. There are three main tabs on the site you’ll use for navigation.

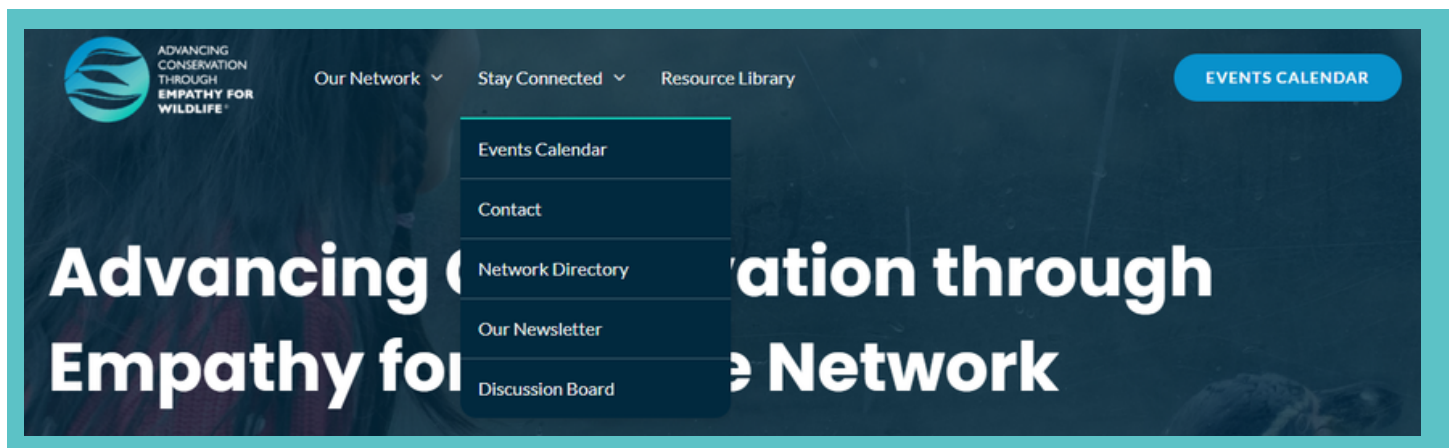


Dropdown: Our Network

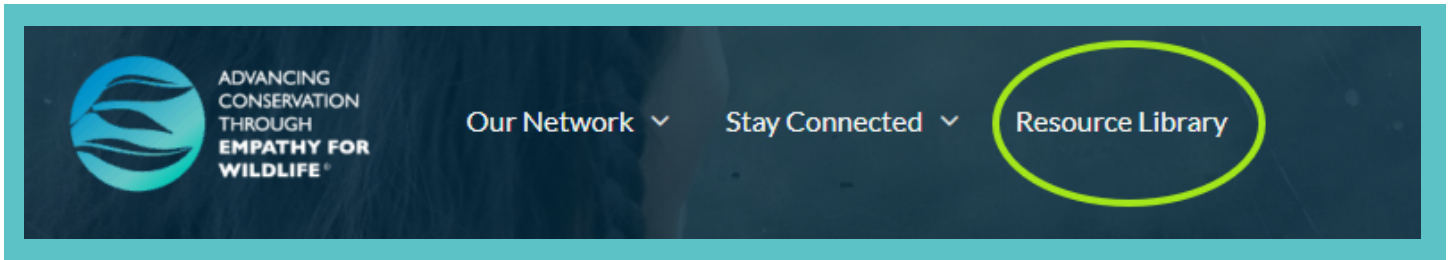
Dropdown: Stay Connected

Our resource library is rich with previous event recordings, research papers, literature reviews, toolkits, and more! With over 350 individual resources, there's something for everyone in our library. Anyone can access our resource library! However, folks will be prompted to log in or join the Network after accessing three resource tiles.

New Network Partner Organizations and Members

When a zoo or aquarium becomes a Network Partner Organization, their staff become Network Members once they create an account on our website. For many organizations, interest in joining the Network started because staff were active in the Network as Affiliates. For those Affiliates, their accounts transition over to Member permissions when their organization becomes a Partner. Any staff who have not yet created an account can do so using their work email and will be automatically approved to access the site and discussion board. Any volunteers wishing to create an account can do so, but a staff member responsible for volunteers should email empathy@zoo.org to let us know which volunteers are creating accounts. This way, the Advancing Empathy team can approve them as they come through. If you are unsure whether your organization is a Partner Organization, please refer to the list of organizations on our About Us page before emailing us at empathy@zoo.org.

Discussion Board

Depending on your preference, you can sort discussion board posts chronologically by selecting the “latest” view, or you can sort them by topic by selecting “category” view. We recommend sorting them by category.

By default, if you do not log into the discussion board for one week, you will get a digest email with all the content you have missed since you last logged in. However, if you wish to change the frequency with which you receive those emails, you can do so by:

1. Clicking on your profile avatar in the top right corner,
2. Clicking on preferences,
3. Clicking on manage your notification settings.

You can also select categories and tags to follow and get notified when posts within those categories or including those tags are created.

Some Network Members and Affiliates have stated that these discussion board digests go to their spam folder. If you find yourself not receiving these emails, we recommend checking your spam or junk folder and adding them to your list of approved senders.

- Developed by Woodland Park Zoo, both of these resources are effectively the same interpretive framework but modeled in different ways. The Empathy Bridge follows a more linear story-arc format, while the Empathy Wheel is seen by some to be more flexible in its non-linear structure. Both can help individuals craft a guest interaction that fosters empathy for wildlife.

Getting the most out of the Network

As a Network, we value shared leadership and collaboration and aim to offer a variety of ways for individuals to engage. Whether you're ready to dive in immediately and get involved in Network leadership, or just looking for resources, we offer something for everyone. This Network wouldn't exist without YOU! If there is a way you would like to engage with the Network that you don't see outlined in this section, feel free to send us an email with your idea to empathy@zoo.org.

We host a variety of virtual events every year to help Network Members and Affiliates connect with one another and provide learning opportunities. You can find events on the homepage of the website as well as the Events Calendar. The Membership Committee recommends Members and Affiliates attend a minimum of four events per year to maximize their experience in the Network. We record the majority of our events, so if you happen to miss them, you can usually find the recording in our Resource Library. In addition to our virtual events, we also host an annual Empathy Summit each February. In odd years, this gathering is in person, whereas in even years, it will occur virtually over Zoom.

Outside of events, we encourage you to use the Network discussion board to interact with other Members and Affiliates, ask questions and offer learnings. Think of it like the AZA discussion boards, but smaller! Per our Code of Conduct, the discussion board is meant to be a place of collaboration that values progress over perfection. An idea at any stage is worth posting—don't worry about it not being a perfectly polished product! Odds are, someone else in the Network is curious about the exact same thing.

ACE for Wildlife Network Committees

For those who wish to have a deeper involvement in the Network, many folks recommend serving on a committee. However, serving on a committee is just one of many leadership opportunities we offer! Requirements of serving on a committee are detailed in our bylaws. The most recent version of our Network's bylaws can be found on the About Us or Steering Committee's pages of our website. The Network currently has six committees. You can learn more about each one below by clicking on their unique webpages.

Communications Committee: This committee aims to effectively facilitate communication within and about the Network in an accessible and inclusive way.

Conservation Action Committee: This committee's mission is to share a common vision to promote Partner conservation missions and motivate visitors to take conservation action.

Diversity, Equity, Accessibility and Inclusion (DEAI) Committee: This committee responsibly promotes an inclusive environment within the Network and facilitates conversations that help Network Members and Affiliates feel supported to incorporate DEAI initiatives into their organizations.

Membership Committee: This committee is responsible for developing the guidelines and practices of ACE for Wildlife Network membership levels and collaborating with the other committees to nurture connections between and within membership levels as the Network grows.

Steering Committee: This committee decides the priorities, goals, structure and direction of the Network. They prioritize goals, establish a timeline and provide implementation support. Decides what committees and groups need to be in place to achieve our goals and make sure the right expertise is in the discussion.

Strategic Learning Committee: This committee drives the learning priorities of the ACE for Wildlife Network so we can collaboratively learn, build skills and share expertise.



Frequently Asked Questions

What if I work at a zoo or aquarium that is a Partner Organization but don't have an email address associated with the zoo or aquarium I'm a part of?

Use your primary email address. Once you go through the process of creating an account, please email empathy@zoo.org to let us know that you've tried to create an account and specify the email that you used. This will let us know to approve your account request.

I just joined as a Network Affiliate, does that mean my whole zoo or aquarium is a part of the ACE for Wildlife Network?

No. The Affiliate status is designated for individuals, not organizations. If you are interested in learning more about how your organization can become a Partner, please contact empathy@zoo.org.

I am a consultant; can I offer my services to others in the Network?

Per our Network [Code of Conduct](#), individuals should not use the Network or its resources for "personal or professional promotions with the exception of peer-to-peer recommendations with a clear connection to the scope of the Network (e.g., individuals should not use their access to directories and the discussion board to promote their business(es) or services)."

I would like to convince others at my zoo or aquarium about the value of fostering empathy for wildlife. Does the Network have resources that can help me make the case?

Glossary of Network Terminology

Every community has their own unique terminology and acronyms, getting up to speed can be daunting. Below is a list of common terms you will hear throughout Network spaces and what they mean. These terms, and more, can be found in our Network & Empathy Glossary.

Advancing Empathy (AE) Staff: The staff at Woodland Park Zoo dedicated to managing and facilitating the ACE for Wildlife Network and the Advancing Empathy Grant Program..

Advancing Empathy Grant Program: A grant initiative led by Woodland Park Zoo that supports eligible AZA-accredited zoos and aquariums in their efforts to plan, build and expand programs that advance empathy for animals and wildlife. Learn more at zoo.org/empathy.

Affiliate: Individuals not at a Partner Organization (such as researchers, consultants, former staff at Partner Organizations, staff at other AZA organizations, and students), but interested in the Network's mission can apply to become a Network Affiliate. They have access to Network resources, the discussion board, communications, activities and events upon the acceptance of their application by the Membership Committee. They are encouraged to serve on committees and/or assist in implementing Network activities.

Empathy Measurement in Zoo & Aquarium Audiences Project (EMZAAP): A multi-institutional collaboration that aims to enhance the capacity of zoos and aquariums to measure empathy toward animals among their audiences. Beginning in January of 2025 and spanning three years, this project is bringing together professionals from six Partner Organizations involved in the ACE for Wildlife Network, along with support from external advisors with expertise in empathy research, to co-design, pilot, and validate one or more empathy measurement tools that can be used and easily adapted to our diverse organizational contexts.

Measuring Empathy Collaborative Assessment Project (MECAP): This project (2015–2017) formed the foundation of the knowledge base that would support the ACE for Wildlife Network. Project partners (Woodland Park Zoo, Point Defiance Zoo & Aquarium, & Seattle Aquarium) aimed to develop, test and share tools that can be used by accredited zoos & aquariums to assess whether their educational programs are having the desired impact of encouraging children's empathy towards animals.



Member: Individuals who work or volunteer at a Partner Organization and participate in the Network. They have access to Network resources, the discussion board, communications and all activities and events after creating an account. They are encouraged to serve on committees and/or assist in implementing Network activities.

Partner Organization: A zoo or aquarium accredited by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) within the United States that has taken all the required steps to join the Network and is committed to empathy as a strategy for conservation.
