**BRAINSTORM: What could you do or say in the program to target these approaches?**

**ENGAGING: SHARE or SHOW something to enhance visitor’s curiosity**

- Share WOW, fun facts
- Use props to enhance interactions
- Help visitors get eyeball to eyeball with the animals
- Volunteer shares what they are excited about, passionate about

**ACTIVE: ENCOURAGE visitors to SLOW DOWN, ASK MORE QUESTIONS and MAKE THEIR OWN OBSERVATIONS**

- Ask visitors questions about what the animals are doing - why do you think they are doing that?
- Encourage comparisons between animals, between animals and people – how are we the same or different?
- Encourage slow seeing and observation – stay and watch with me! What do you notice? What does it make you think of?
- Why zoos matter – why are these animals here? How did they get here?
- How to continue the conversation past – how old is it? Is it a boy or girl? Or what to do if you don’t know an answer
- Ask visitors if they have questions related to what they are curious about, observing, noticing, commenting on, etc.

**COMO-ALIGNED: CONNECT visitors to Como’s animal ambassadors by SHARING how Como Cares and USING AND MODELING empathic strategies**

- Tell the stories of the individual animals – share short stories to give a glimpse into the animal’s life
- Connect what the animals are doing to what people do – eat, sleep, play, relationships, etc.
- Real Como stories and histories
- Species animal needs (natural history and/or individual) and Como/keepers meeting their needs (animal welfare)
- Use names and pronouns
- Encourage good caring action – don’t tap on the glass (and why)
- Why supporting Como supports conservation, How Como does conservation & supported orgs
- Language choices – “words that matter”
- Animal roleplay - with kids – act out a behavior
- Provide repeat or extended experiences with the same animal – i.e.; come see Virgil at the Gorilla program!
- Connections to Como – share insider info, personal stories and experiences
